Guest Speaker: Gordon Frierson, MD



Guarding the Golden Gate: The Story of the United States Quarantine Station on Angel Island

J. Gordon Frierson, MD is a clinical professor emeritus in the Department of Medicine, University of California San Francisco. After a decades long career in the medical field, Frierson continues his long standing interest in the history of

medicine with the publication of Yellow Fever Vaccine: A History in the Yale Journal of Biology and Medicine 2010 and Guarding the Golden Gate: The Story of the United States Quarantine Station on Angel Island 2022. He is a member of the Bay Area History of Medicine Society, the American Osler Society and the American Association for the History of Medicine. He also authored 3 chapters in: Cooper, David, ed., Doctors of Another Calling 2013; University of Delaware Press. The chapters are short biographies of Leonard Wood, Sun Yat-sen, and John Harvey Kellogg, all physicians who drifted into non-medical activities.

Gordon will be speaking about the U.S. Government Quarantine Station that used to exist on Angel Island (opened in 1891). The station's function was to quarantine people (largely immigrants) coming to California with diseases such as smallpox, plague, cholera, etc. before they got ashore, at a time when knowledge of how these diseases were spread was still primitive. The talk will cover two plague epidemics in San Francisco, both smallpox outbreaks, and the process of quarantining thousands of people and disinfecting their ships. It is based on his book *Guarding the Golden Gate*, mentioned above.

Scardino Has the Round of the Month

Stan Scardino was 4.1 strokes "under" on Feb. 3 at Sunnyvale Muni. Not only did he have the "Round of the Month," as you'll read in the next article, he had the "Month of Month"!

Five Wins in a Row for Scardino

Stan Scardino is on an unprecedented winning streak in Palmer flight #2. He's not winning by just a shot or two - his average margin of victory is 5.4 strokes! Here's the tally:

- Jan. 27 at Los Lagos Eclectic Round 3 he won by 4 strokes (and won his flight for the Eclectic as a whole).
- Jan. 30 at Callippe Preserve by 3 strokes
- Feb. 3 at Sunnyvale by 5 strokes
- Feb. 10 at DeLaveaga by 5 strokes
- Feb. 19 at Baylands by 10 strokes!

When he started his victory streak on Jan. 27 Stan's handicap index was 27.4. By Feb. 24 (Crystal Springs) he had lowered it to 25.7. Read on to find out how he did it!

How I Improved My Golf Game – by Stan Scardino

(Bruce asked Stan to share the secret of his recent success.) I can offer 2 reasons:

- My index. It had climbed to a point of embarrassment over the past 3 years. I decided that there was not a fix. I needed a process.
- 2. The Process. Like many golfers of my vintage, I had tried getting my game "fixed" with any number of itinerant golf instructors you can find at any public course. They would move your hands, change your stance and take your money. It works for some, but it wasn't working for me. I realized I needed to acquire a repeatable process to work with.



A few years back I had watched Bob Garten improve his game fairly dramatically. He told me about Golftec, a "process" golf school headquartered in Colorado with facilities around the country. Their professionals are trained in the Golftec process. I started with Golftec in 2019. It worked and I won the SIR "Most Improved Golfer" in 2021. (My index had dropped to 18).

In 2022 I took on a sizable volunteer Job that kept me out of golf for a couple of years. As they say in the Star Wars movies, the "force" was no longer with me -- index back to 28!

So, I re-engaged with Golftec and now feel like I am coming out of the doldrums with a lot of time on the driving range and swing adjustments which have led to confidence to compete.

Consequently, with my mental state believing the process works, my golf has improved, and I am playing better than my index. So, in conclusion, I would recommend a process over a fix! (Bruce adds – Golftec has facilities in San Jose and Foster City.)





Lincoln Lawyer. Season 3 of the Netflix series is now complete. Manuel Garcia-Rulfo is back as iconoclastic lawyer, Mickey Haller. Based in LA, Mickey's Hispanic roots and savvy are useful. In Season 3 his client is accused of murdering a call girl. A new DA is prosecuting the case who seems a dufus but is quite clever. Mickey's team is very capable and assists him in tracking down the real culprits. The real criminals are on the inside of law

enforcement. They prove very hard to expose. Each episode layers in new complexities that keep our interest. This is one to see, maybe even binge, but each episode (of ten) is about 1 hour. Rated TV MA for language and sexual content.



Becoming Led Zeppelin. If you are a fan of the band or of the music of the 1960s this is a must see. Led Zeppelin exploded on the music scene in 1968, but the members had earned their chops earlier in the decade. The film takes a deep dive into rock'n'roll and Led Zeppelin in particular. The documentary includes new interviews with Jimmy Page, Robert Plant and John Paul Jones. They are still active in music. There are even archival interviews

with the band's late drummer John Bonham who died in 1980. The band disbanded with his demise. This is quite a treat so be sure to see and hear it where the sound is exceptional. Rated PG-13 for some drug references and smoking. In Theatres. It is a Peggy's Pick.



The Seed of the Sacred Fig. Writer/Director Mohammad Rasoulof brings us a powerful indictment of the political/religious reality in today's Iran. He was sentenced to eight years in prison and flogging for making films critical of the current regime but was able to escape to the West. This entire film was made in secret. Set in Iran during the protests after a young woman was killed for not wearing her

hajib properly. It is a fictional drama about a religious man who is a government investigating judge and his family. His two daughters side with the protestors. He is a traditional Muslim official who believes he is doing god's will by following the dictates where clerics. His wife enables him but is also fiercely protective of her family. She is caught in the middle of supporting her husband in traditional ways but sees the freedom her daughters want and deserve. The film has dramatic changes of tone that build to a strange climax. It handles issues of honesty and integrity in a world full of lies and irrational conflict. This is a very well-made film that is deserving of its award nominations. Check it out. Rated PG-13 for disturbing violent content, bloody images, thematic content, some language and smoking. In Theatres. In Persian with subtitles. It is a Peggy's Pick.

MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe periods that we lived through. This monthly article hopes to spur those memorable moments in your life when you first saw the movie or heard the song from your youth. What were you doing ... in days of yore? **Ron**



Movie: "Road to Singapore" Bing Crosby, Dorothy Lamour, Bob Hope, March 14, 1940

Remember this movie? It was released on December 8, 1978, in two theaters, one in New York and the other in Los Angeles so it would qualify for Oscar consideration. The marketing strategy worked, and it garnered nominations in nine Academy categories and won in five, including Best Picture, Best Director, and Best Supporting Actor for Christopher Walken. It

was Meryl Streep's first Oscar nomination. Robert De Niro's tourde-force performance should have won the Best Actor Oscar, but John Voight won for his role in "Coming Home". (Editor's note: Coming Home was another Vietnam war movie that dealt with a damaged marine returning home. It was nominated for eight Academy Awards and won in three for Best Actress (Jane Fonda), Best Actor (John Voight), and Best Original Screenplay.)

I don't usually dwell into the plot of a film, but this one is an exception as much of it brings back memories of the daily television and front-page news stories about the Vietnam War.

This story started with the screenplay "The Man Who Came to Play" involving Las Vegas and Russian roulette, a term coined to describe a game of gambling with death. The script was purchased by Michael Deeley who hired Michael Cimino, to direct it. He in turn hired Deric Washburn to write the screenplay embedding the game of chance into his Vietnam war story.


You recall the controversy with this movie as critics wrote that the Russian roulette scene was a gimmick to add drama. Vietnam veterans protested the sensationalism of the fictitious scene and how the movie undermined the real trauma and tragedy that veterans experienced, later diagnosed as PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder).

Here are some lesser-known facts about the director, the actors, and the movie.

- The Director, Michael Cimino said in an interview with The New York Times that he served in Vietnam as a medic with the Green Berets. This is False.
- Cimino claimed that Washburn's script was like "...written by somebody who was... mentally deranged" and so he rewrote the entire screenplay himself. This is False.




A young Michael Cimino on-set

- The scene where the Viet Cong forced their prisoners to play Russian roulette with each other as they placed their bets was dramatic but False.
- In the post war Russian roulette scene, Cimino convinced Christopher Walken to spit in Robert De Niro's face.
 Walken did it in a close-up shot. De Niro was surprised and completely shocked, as evidenced by his reaction. At the end of the shot, he was furious and nearly left the set. Cimino later said of Walken, "He's got balls!" This is True.
- So how do you shoot a cold, rainy, autumn segment in the Pittsburgh steel mill area in the middle of a hot summer? Well, the Cimino (Hollywood) method was to spray the grass with weed killer and go around stripping the leaves off the trees. To make it more autumn like they filmed in the early mornings and evenings after the sun set (what's called the magic hour) and used blue filters on the lenses and film coloring to get that winter look. The actors were in full winter clothing even though the temperatures were well over 100 degrees. They finally brought in a large air

conditioner to get the temperatures down to 80-85 degrees. True.

 John Cazale (Best known for his role as Fredo Corleone in "Godfather") was weak from lung cancer when filming began so Cimino knew to film his scenes first. When the studio found out, they wanted to replace him but Meryl Streep, who was in love with him, threatened to quit if they did. Cazale was 43 when he died, shortly after filming was completed. True.

- Editor's note: John Cazale was a close friend of Al Pacino who he grew up with and helped get him discovered in Hollywood. He later did the same for Robert De Niro and Meryl Streep. All six feature films he acted in were nominated for an Academy Award. He so impressed Francis Ford Coppola in Godfather I that Coppola wrote a much bigger part for him in Godfather II.
- French director Francois Truffaut said in an interview with BBC, that "There's no such thing as an anti-war film." Truffaut observed that the inherent spectacle of cinema means that any on-screen portrayal of war will inevitably end up glorifying warfare instead of criticizing it. The depiction of the savagery of American soldiers is topped by the depiction of even more callousness and cruelty by the Viet Cong. The tit-for-tat behavior of both sides when war has no rules but one ... win. True.

The very first thing you recall when you hear her name is how sad that she died so young. She was 32 when her body could no longer function from her many years of suffering from a condition known as Anorexia

Nervosa, little known at that time. I usually focus on a song and its impact at the time of its popularity, but it is her body of work that is worthy of recall and her life that is worth remembering.

Karen might best be described as an All-American Girl. She was unpretentious and her smile was friendly and sincere. Normally dressed and well mannered, the sister-brother team were easy to like. She had a contralto voice (lowest of the female vocal range) with a three-octave range and that is where she normally sang, but she also had the rare ability to transition to a much lower range – something she called her "basement". This range of her voice was used masterfully by her brother selecting and arranging songs that tended toward the melancholy. Listen to the loneliness in her voice along with the solitary harmonica in "Rainy Days" and the harp in "Superstar". Karen's voice, always a little mysterious and distant in these types of songs, made one feel pensive and reflective. Listen to what Karen and a piano created in the opening verse of "Solitaire". There are moments like that on just about every song the Carpenters recorded.

Her songs were described as light pop, nice, clean, not rebellious, with the most common theme of young people in love. Another article described her voice "... as smooth, warm, and controlled." The arrangement and instrumental riffs were technically flawless due to her brother Richard and the countless hours of rehearsals.

Paul McCartney said she had "...the best female voice in the world: melodic, tuneful and distinctive." Elton John said she has "one of the greatest voices of our lifetime." Rolling Stone magazine ranked her No 94 on its list of 100 Greatest Singers of All Time", describing her voice as "...impossibly lush and almost shockingly intimate", adding "...even the sappiest songs sound like she was staring directly into your eyes."

A WHALE OF A TALE Whale watching and Camping in Baja California

In February, my wife, Birdie, and I joined a few friends in a camping, driving and whale watching outing in Baja California. For those who haven't experienced Baja outside of the major resorts, it is rural, remote, unspoilt and beautiful. People are friendly and welcoming. Hotels and restaurants are simple but good, camping on the beaches is legal and largely free and the food is excellent.

It's hard to describe how good simple, fresh, natural food tastes to us who are so used to eating preserved, highly processed and often bland food in the US!

While the scenery is beautiful and camping on the beaches is a memorable treat, the highlight of the trip was a whale watching tour we did out of Guerrero Negro in a protected lagoon on the West Coast. This highly salinated, warm, shallow lagoon is several miles in diameter and has very few predators, as orcas and sharks prefer colder waters. For this reason, it is where grey whales bring their young to learn to swim and strengthen up before attempting the long migration north. It has been a whale preserve since 1972, one of the earliest whale preserves in the world.

Whale watching is done in 30' open boats with small engines, but once in the general vicinity of whales, the engines are cut to idle and we wait. Before long, whales come up to the boat to check us out, unafraid and unwary of us.

I was swept with emotion as whales twice the size of the boat came alongside, gently rubbing against the boat without bumping, feelling our hands as we rubbed their heads.

Their heads are covered in gold-tinted barnacles that look like jewels. They often roll to the side and we make eye contact as we check each other out, equally curious and attracted. I imagine they consider us cute little things, like kittens or something!
