The Book Club is an activity where most months of the year, all members read the same book and then meet to discuss it.



For our March meeting, we read "The Diamond Eye" by Kate Quinn. In 1937 in the snowbound city of Kyiv, wry and bookish history student Mila Pavlichenko organizes her life around her library job and her young son--but Hitler's invasion of Ukraine and Russia sends her on a different path. Given a rifle and sent to

join the fight, Mila must forge herself from studious girl to deadly sniper--a lethal hunter of Nazis known as "Lady Death." When news of her three hundredth kill makes her a national heroine, Mila finds herself torn from the bloody battlefields of the eastern front and sent to America on a goodwill tour.

Still reeling from war wounds and devastated by loss, Mila finds herself isolated and lonely in the glittering world of Washington, DC until an unexpected friendship with First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, and an even more unexpected connection with a silent fellow sniper, offers the possibility of happiness. But when an old enemy from Mila's past joins forces with a deadly new foe lurking in the shadows, Lady Death finds herself battling her own demons and enemy bullets in the deadliest duel of her life.

Based on a true story, The Diamond Eye is a haunting novel of heroism born of desperation, of a mother who became a soldier, of a woman who found her place in the world and changed the course of history forever. Book club members generally found the book very interesting.

For April, our book is "James" by Percival Everett.

### Tran Shoots the Round of the Month

Man Tran had the kind of round that most of us can only dream about on February 27 at Moffett Field. He shot 8.1 strokes under his expected score (net 64 on the Par 72 course) and is the early season leader for Round of the Year honors. Well done, Man!

### Scardino's Winning Streak Continues

Stan Scardino continued his winning ways in March. He won the Palmer #2 flight on March 10 at Spring Valley. It was his sixth consecutive victory in that flight. He was the lowest handicapper in Palmer Flight #2 (25.7 index) and is only 0.1 strokes from being bumped up to Palmer #1 flight.

### New Golf Rules for U.K. Seniors

The Veterans Golf Association has negotiated with The Royal and Ancient in St. Andrews to modify the Rules of Golf for seniors in the United Kingdom. These new rules will only apply to men aged 65 and above.

Rule 1.a.5 A ball sliced or hooked into the rough shall be lifted and placed on the fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into the rough with no penalty. The senior should not be penalized for tall grass which groundskeepers failed to mow.

Rule 2.d.6 (b) A ball hitting a tree shall be deemed not to have hit the tree. This is simply bad luck, and luck has no place in a scientific game. The senior player must estimate the distance the ball would have travelled if it had not hit the tree and play the ball from there.

Rule 3.b.3(g) There shall be no such thing as a lost ball. The missing ball is on or near the course and will eventually be found and pocketed by someone else, making it a stolen ball. The player need not compound the felony by charging himself with a penalty.

Rule 4.c.7(h) If a putt passes over a hole without dropping, it is deemed to have dropped. The law of gravity supersedes the Rules of Golf.

Rule 5. Putts that stop close enough to the cup that they could be blown in, may be blown in. This does not apply to balls more than three inches from the hole. No one wants to make a travesty of the game.

Rule 6.a.9(k) There is no penalty for so-called "out of bounds." If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior golfer deserves an apology, not a penalty.

Rule 7.g.15(z) There is no penalty for a ball in a water hazard, as golf balls should float. Senior golfers should not be penalized for manufacturers' shortcomings.



But more importantly she engineered the purchase of the first Ronald McDonald House allowing millions of families to stay close to their children while under treatment. The story is compelling and the performances powerful. Put this on your mustsee list. Rated PG for thematic content, smoking and some language. In Theatres. It is a Peggy's Pick.



This film combines Black Bag. three genres in a clever but confusing way. It is a spy thriller, romance, drama that relies heavily on the acting prowess of Cate Blanchett and of Michael Fassbinder. Blanchett is a British intelligence agent, Kathryn. She is suspected of betraying her country with leaks of highly sensitive information. Fassbinder is her husband and boss. He is a master spy and charged with ferreting out

# STRE MCQUEEN - RICHARD ATTENBOROUGH RICHARD CREININA - CADICE BERGEN SENSAL

Movie: "The Sand Pebbles", December 20, 1966

Baby Boomers will likely remember this movie from 1966. The movie was the fourth highest grossing film that year at \$30 million and was nominated for eight Academy Awards, winning none. This movie from our past, was selected for review principally because of the performance of Steve McQueen and Candice Bergen. Here are some background facts

before we spotlight these actors.

The movie was based on the book, "The Sand Pebbles" authored by Richard McKenna, a former U.S. Navy sailor and engineer aboard a gunboat, plying the Yangtze and other rivers in China in the 1930's. The U.S. had emerged as the newest member aligned with a small group of European powers that controlled and exploited China during this period. The villains in the movie are the Nationalists under Chiang Kai-shek, not the Communists as they were in the minority, but aligned with the Nationalist's goal to kick the Imperialists out of their country.

Robert Wise directed this film and shepherded the project for four years before he was ready to film it. The creation of a suitable script from the book, finding suitable locations for various shoots, creating and building the "San Pablo" ship prop, and many other production challenges created the lengthy constipation period. Wise was fortunate during this period as he was offered another project that was ready to go, "The Sound of Music". He did so and that of course became a huge success. This and his previous direction of "West Side Story" gave him carte blanche for this film project.

Following that shoot, he led a Hollywood cast and crew numbering more than one hundred to Keelung, Tam Sui and Taipei on the island of Taiwan, for on-location filming. Principal filming began November 22, 1965, but the two-month planned shoot kept going until May 1966. As he took so much film, the theatrical release ran quite long at 182 minutes, and the extended "roadshow" version was even14 minutes longer.

Paul Newman was originally offered the role of Jake Holman but turned it down because the character was "not redeemable". (Editor's note: Newman felt the character's flaws and actions were too extreme and lacked the potential for positive change or growth, making him unsuitable for him to portray." Isn't this a movie and not real life? Hollywood can't seem to separate fiction from nonfiction.) He was the bigger star at the time but over the two years that it took to get the film started McQueen's stardom grew to rival Paul's. They did share a rivalry and dislike for each other in life more because McQueen always sought top billing and attention in acting as well as racing. An interesting fact is McQueen was offered the part as Sundance with Paul Newman in "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" but turned it down because Paul had top billing. Of course, that role was the big break for Robert Redford.

#### Now, let's focus on the actors:

Steve McQueen was the consummate antihero who fit In with America's turbulent evolution during the 1960s counterculture era. He was not the full-fledged lead man at the time he was approached and agreed to be in the film. He had worked his way up the popularity ladder with his first lead start in the television

series "Wanted Dead or Alive" 1958-61, then to his first big break on the big screen with "The Blob" in 1958, followed by "The Magnificent Seven" in1960. Over the two years it took to get to the on-location shoot for Sand Pebbles, he solidified his stardom with his role in "The Great Escape" released in 1963.

McQueen was nicknamed the "King of Cool" after "Sand Pebbles", as he continued to play lead characters that were cool characters in action-dominated roles with some dialogue sprinkled in here and there. Remember "Bullitt" (1968), "The Thomas Crown Affair" (1968), "Le Mans" (1971), and of course, "Papillon" (1973). He portrayed authentic, he exulted cool.

Candice Bergen was 19 years old when she took on her role as Shirley, an assistant schoolteacher in the movie. She was the daughter of Edgar Bergen the famous ventriloquist, so she had a privileged childhood. Even at such a young age she demonstrated her maturity that complemented her natural, innocent beauty. She attended the University of Pennsylvania where she was selected Homecoming Queen. Unfortunately, she acknowledged that she did not take her education seriously and failed out of school.



Bergen was uneasy around McQueen, found him friendly but challenging, 'though no sign of it here!

- Bergen capitalized on her beauty and became a fashion model. Successful in that profession she enrolled in acting school. Her role in Sand Pebbles was her second film role. From this success she went on to parts in many movies that generally did not do well. She finally found her acting success as Murphy in "Murphy Brown". That television series ran for ten seasons garnering her five Emmy Awards and several Golden Globes.
- Why was "Sand Pebbles" so memorable and impactful? One can only speculate, and many have, saying that it created a buzz at the time because of its parallel to the ongoing Vietnam War, where imperialism was pitted against nationalism. Steve McQueen was the alienated and disillusioned sailor trying to live his life in the engine room he loved but was forced out of his shell, first to defend his boat and later, the naïve missionary and teacher he had just met. Ultimately, he sacrificed his life for a cause he questioned. "I was home ..., what happened? ... WHAT THE HELL HAPPENED?", as the story ends.

### Music: Ballad of the Green Berets by Staff Sergeant Barry Sadler – 1966

This was the most popular song of 1966 reaching #1 on the Billboard Hot 100 for over five weeks. It was written by Staff Sergeant Barry Sadler, a Green Beret soldier.

The story goes that Sadler enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in 1958. In the Air Force, he was trained as a radar technician stationed in Japan. After a short stint as a civilian he enlisted in the U.S. Army and volunteered for Airborne and Special Forces. (Editor's note: The Green Berets are a part of U.S. Special Forces Command. Their mission is to train foreign forces to conduct direct action, special reconnaissance, and unconventional warfare. The training they undergo is extensive, lasting over a year with specialty training to include airborne parachute jumping, and foreign language. The Green Berets are organized in twelve men teams for stealth and maneuverability.) Stadler became a Green Beret, specialized as a medic and was deployed to Vietnam in 1965. In May 1965, he was on a combat patrol near Pleiku when he suffered a knee length wound from a punji spike (sharpened stick, tipped with a poison or contaminant (feces) to cause infection, injury or death). He dressed his wound and completed the patrol, but the wound became seriously infected, so he was evacuated to Clark Hospital at the U.S. Air Base in the Philippines for treatment. He was stabilized and then sent back to Ft Bragg, home of the Green Berets for rehabilitation.



While there he worked on his song. He met Robin Moore at Fort Bragg when Robin was an author who wanted to write about the Green Berets so was enrolled in the training program. Moore did finish and published "The Green Berets" in 1965 which became a best seller in 1966. Moore was instrumental in helping Sadler finish his ballad and get it published. The song was one of the few popular war songs during the Vietnam period. Some of his Green Beret comrades resented that he profited while they fought and died in the meat grinder that was Vietnam.

The song is played in a choral rendition in the 1968 movie "The Green Berets" which was only memorable because John Wayne was in it.

I had never heard this version sung by Dolly Parton and released in 2003. She is an authentic professional singer, and her version evokes patriotic emotion as you listen to it. It is also a longer version with additional verses, lyrics, and ending.
